Lamar Days Parade

Adult Admission Information Night at LCC

The first one was held May 23rd, 2023 and while it was not heavily attended, it still showed us where we need to reach out to the adults in our community and the issues that adults are facing when contemplating furthering their education. Many adults face boundaries such as work schedules, family schedules and children, housework, transportation and ultimately the cost of attendance is not entirely about funds. One third of college students start their educational journeys as adults, nearly 5 million college students are parents, and 58 percent of adult learners work while enrolled in school. We at Lamar Community College have started providing information to these demographics to help them face these challenges as they come back to college with key enrollment advising, courses that are best suited for their busy schedules and scholarship/grant information to help them cover the costs of their education. We hope to have many more attendees in the future and to assist families in our community make the most out of their educational opportunities.

Baseball All-Region Honors

Six players from the Lamar Community College Runnin' Lopes were given Region 9 All-Region Awards in recognition of their play during the 2022-2023 season. Brian Ledezma earned First-Team, Garrett Rede earned Second Team, Brayden Peyon, Jonathan Davis, Damien Ashley and Hunter Boneau were honored with Honorable Mentions.

FIRST TEAM ALL-REGION: Brian Ledezma, a sophomore from Albuquerque, NM earned his award while playing 1st base. Ledezma recorded 67 hits including 16 doubles, 18 Home Runs, 69 RBI's and finishing with an average of .411 in the 61 game season.

SECOND TEAM ALL-REGION: Garrett Rede, a sophomore transfer from Rio Rancho, NM earned his award playing Shortstop and mixing in at 3rd base for the Lopes. Rede recorded 60 put outs and 95 assists. He recorded 62 hits including 19 doubles, 15 Home Runs, 56 RBI's and finishing with an average of .350 in the 61 game season.

HONORABLE MENTIONS: Brayden Peyton, a sophomore transfer from Albuquerque, NM played catcher for the Lopes. Hitting .287, 43 hits, 10 Home Runs and collecting 36 RBI's. Jonathan Davis, a freshman from Midlothian, TX played outfield hitting .358 on the season, along with 57 hits, 12 doubles, 9 Home Runs and collecting 43 RBI's. Hunter Boneau, a redshirt sophomore from Parker, CO a right-handed pitcher for the Lopes. Hunter threw 38.1 innings out of the bullpen, while collecting 45 strikeouts against 19 walks, 61 hits and a 9.86 ERA. Damien Ashley, a redshirt freshman transfer from Port Charlotte, FL a right-handed pitcher threw 71.2 innings as a starter for the Lopes. Collecting 64 strikeouts against 22 walks and a 8.54 ERA.

New Mascot

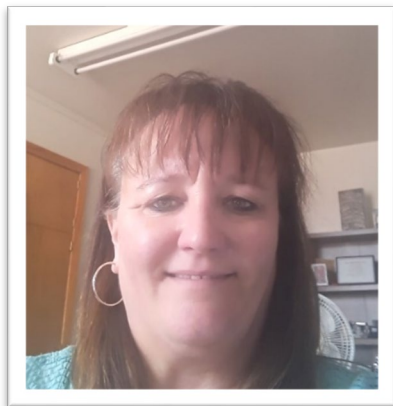

Legacy Horse Show and Sale

The second annual Lamar Community College Legacy Horse Sale, held on April 28, proved to be a resounding success. With a packed venue and the participation of over 75 potential buyers, including online attendees, a total of sixteen horses were sold, fetching prices ranging from \$1,500 to \$18,000. The overall sales reached an impressive approximate total of \$127,400, marking a significant 24% increase in average sale per head compared to the previous year. The event, organized based on recommendations from the HTM and EBM Advisory Committee, provided students with valuable hands-on experience in sales event planning, marketing material development (including videos, social media, and a printed program), horse preparation, vet checks, and auctions. Each horse was showcased in front of an enthusiastic audience, resulting in fast-paced and lively bidding. While bidding moments brought a mix of emotions for students witnessing their trained horses being passed to new owners, the attendees expressed high praise for the program, faculty, and students.



Plans are already underway for next year's sale, building upon the success of this year's event. Importantly, a portion of the sales proceeds directly contributes to the Horse Training Management and Equine Business Management auxiliary accounts, bolstering the programs' resources. The accomplishment of this sale was made possible through the generous support of numerous sponsors within the community.

Imagine and Make Space Summer Camps

Michele Girard, Director of the Imagine and Make Space (IMS) has organized several dates throughout the summer in which she will host artistic summer camps available to the entire community. Michele offers a range of crafts and certifications from sewing, quilting, fiber and knitting, beading, jewelry making, leather crafts, toy making, and ceramics/pottery. Many families from the local communities take advantage of these summer camps and let their children explore their creativity with us. Each camp provides a different theme and materials for attendees to learn a new machine/participate in a new craft such as handmade tote bags, embroidery on personal items and watercolor art.



Cosmetology Program Expansion

The LCC Cosmetology Program has been on the rise! Cosmetology and Barber instructor Kendra King has expanded the program to include more course hours for Nail Tech for the summer and already has a waiting list. In fact, the course has gotten so full that Kendra has had to take over additional classroom space near the LCC salon to accommodate the growth in her program.

Kendra also submitted an article to the Lamar Ledger titled “Licensed to Create” regarding the Pros and Cons of earning and practicing with a degree in Cosmetology. Cosmetology is an artful instruction of specific sets of skills for making people feel better about their hair, skin, and nails. Once a student acquires the instructional delivered cosmetology skills, these are expanded by the individual stylist’s creativity, helping clients, in turn, express theirs.

The field of cosmetology continues to expand. There are more than 600,000 stylists employed in the United States as hairstylists or cosmetologists. For the client’s health and protection, state licensing is a requirement to work in the industry. Academic preparation is required for your scope of practice to sit for a state board exam leading to a license in your state. At Lamar Community College, the Cosmetology Department masterfully delivers the required skills for multiple state certifications that allow you to sit for the state board exam, become licensed, and launch your career as an entrepreneur in this industry. With a 96% state board pass rate, we pride ourselves in teaching excellence in industry skills and business management.



High School Tours

Lamar Community College offers personalized tours to local and outreaching high schools in Colorado and the immediate surrounding areas. Our admissions department organizes a tour based on information given about the interests and possible educational programs that the students will be pursuing post high school graduation. On May 4th, we were excited to welcome Edison High School from Yoder, Colorado. While Yoder is a smaller school than schools from the Denver and Pueblo areas, they are no less important to reach out to regarding their future educational opportunities. The Edison school students were given a campus tour that involved demonstrations from the Nursing program, Welding, and the Equine Business/Horse Training Management programs.



Construction Trades COPERR Grant

Communities in Southeast Colorado have long faced challenges with blighted housing and shortages on available housing stock. This housing shortage is largely due to the age of houses and the lack of appropriately trained labor in the area. Many of these houses were constructed before 1990, and a large percentage of those were constructed before 1939. Because the cost to repair, rebuild, or renovate the houses often exceeds their resale value, many commercial homebuilders will not build in the area.

That is why Attorney General Phil Weiser announced a new grant program in the Office of Community Engagement designed to both revitalize rural housing and support construction training programs at community colleges in Southeast Colorado.

The Colorado Attorney General's Office, as part of its new Colorado Partnership for Education and Rural Revitalization (COPERR), announced in 2020 grants of up to \$5 million to Trinidad State College and Lamar Community College to develop skilled trades programs that will address labor shortages and increase the availability of viable and affordable housing in southern Colorado. In February 2023, the office announced an expansion of the program to include a new trades program at Pueblo Corporate College, a division of Pueblo Community College, and expanded programs at Trinidad State College and Lamar Community College.



Lamar Community College has received additional grant funding to expand its programming to include high school students at two remote high school locations located in the northern and southern parts of LCC's service area. LCC has used two mobile classroom trailers to work directly with high schools in each region, with the goal of either creating a pipeline for students into college or the ability to seek employment utilizing the knowledge they gain through COPERR courses. LCC anticipates completing six renovation projects with at least three renovations outside the city of Lamar, but within LCC's service area. Below are before and after images of the most current project that LCC Construction Trade students have undertaken in our community.

“From the very beginning of this outstanding project, the attorney general and his team have recognized the importance of rural colleges working to solve rural problems, like substandard housing,” said retiring LCC president, Dr. Linda Lujan. “LCC is so appreciative of the funding, support, and trust placed in us through this grant and is excited to expand opportunities to other areas of Southeast Colorado as the college engages high school students in more remote areas in the construction trades program. It’s a win for students, communities, the college, and Colorado.”

“From my view as vice president of instructional service,” said Larry McLemore of LCC, “I see the COPERR grant opportunity as far reaching and critical in the LCC mission. As we redefine our responsibilities to our service area post pandemic, I see the innovation present in this grant as the model of what is possible for all areas of instruction. Not only serving the immediate need in housing infrastructure, the COPERR grant will set the example of how LCC meets the needs of our rural communities.”

“To me the COPERR program brings so much growth to Lamar and Southeastern Colorado,” said Jake Specht, construction trades instructor. “Students who may not have otherwise attended higher education are learning valuable skills in a program that suits them, all while also rebuilding our community. Watching the students grow and the progress of rebuilding homes has been one of the most rewarding things I’ve been a part of. It is exciting to think of what the future holds for both COPERR and the LCC Construction Trades program.”
