Suicide Prevention Awareness

In a heartfelt effort to promote mental health awareness and foster a culture of compassion and connection, LCC and the Behavorial Health Team hosted the 2nd annual Suicide Prevention Awareness event, an impactful event dedicated to suicide prevention. Students, staff, and community members came together in a safe and welcoming space to engage in open conversations about mental health challenges, the importance of early intervention, and the power of support networks. The event featured educational sessions on recognizing warning signs of suicidal ideation, understanding risk factors, and learning how to respond effectively when someone may be in crisis. Attendees were introduced to a variety of local and national resources, including counseling services, crisis hotlines, peer support groups, and wellness programs. Interactive activities encouraged participants to reflect on their own mental health journeys and explore strategies for self-care, resilience, and emotional well-being. Speakers shared personal stories of hope and recovery, reminding everyone that healing is possible and that no one has to face their struggles alone. We also had the opportunity to hear from Mr. Anthony LaTour who lost his son Anthony to suicide 7 years ago. Above all, the event emphasized the importance of human connection; how a simple conversation, a listening ear, or a gesture of kindness can make a life-saving difference. It was a powerful reminder that reaching out for help is a sign of strength, and that together, we can build a community where everyone feels seen, heard, and supported.

LCC Runnin' Lopes Golf Team Holds Strong in District 9 Standings

After a hard-fought effort, the LCC Runnin' Lopes finished in 2nd place at the Eastern Wyoming tournament, for the second consecutive week at the NPCC Men's Fall Invite. The team showed resilience and determination, and their performance continues to reflect steady progress in the Region IX competition.

Shatzer Shines as Medalist

Freshman Cody Shatzer led the charge, earning medalist honors with rounds of 69 and 75 (144)—edging out Eastern Wyoming's Troy Young by a single stroke (73-72). With this solo first-place finish, Cody now leads the District 9 individual standings with 21 points, four ahead of Eastern Wyoming's Jamie Lambert and Ben Brown (17 points each).

Strong Supporting Cast

Freshman Parker Shirola continued his impressive run, finishing 6th overall with scores of 76 and 73 (149). Despite missing the first event, Parker has climbed to 8th place in the division with 8 points.

Freshman Calvert Layne posted rounds of 77 and 80 (157) to finish tied for 11th, while Preston Buchner (77-87 = 164) and Preston Peters (84-85 = 169) rounded out the top five starters for LCC.

The LCC students took on the role of judges, evaluating the exhibitors' skills and providing scores based on showmanship, handling techniques, and overall presentation in the ring. "This hands-on judging opportunity gives our students real-world experience in animal evaluation and reinforces the skills they've been developing in class," said Dr. Brian Gauck, LCC Ag Department instructor. The collaboration between LCC and the Kiowa County Fair not only strengthens ties between educational institutions and local agricultural communities but also provides valuable experiential learning for students pursuing careers in agriculture and animal sciences. LCC continues to promote opportunities like this for students to gain field experience, leadership skills, and community involvement through their Agriculture program and student organizations like the Ag Club.

LCC Partners with CSU Extension and Local Experts for Colorado Wheat Field Trials

Lamar, CO — A collaborative effort is underway at Lamar Community College (LCC) as part of the Colorado Field Trials (COFT) wheat research program. Arosha LokuUmagiliyagi, LCC Agriculture Instructor, and Michaela Mattes, Area Extension Specialist, Colorado State University Extension, teamed up with local farmer and veterinarian Dr. Jensen Stulp and three LCC students from the AGY 1100 General Crop Production class to plant four different wheat varieties on a three-acre plot located at the south end of the LCC campus. This initiative supports statewide research focused on evaluating and improving wheat varieties suitable for Colorado's diverse agricultural conditions. LCC extends a special thank-you to Dr. Stulp for his dedication and assistance in completing the planting for this important research project.
